A different perspective

⁴⁴ But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, ⁴⁵ that you may be children of your Father in heaven. He causes his sun to rise on the evil and the good, and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous.

Matthew 5:44-45.

Well, God has sent plenty of rain this summer! It seems that we barely get a couple of days of consistent weather before it all changes again. It seems very clear that our climate seems to be changing. But this is nothing new. Between the 14th and 19th centuries Britain was in the grip of the Little Ice Age when global temperatures dropped by around 0.5 degrees centigrade. The early part of that time the summers too were wet and harvests poor and many starved. We know that weather changes are having an impact on our current farming communities with production yields being affected by poor harvest pushing up prices. As I write this (in mid-September) Poland is under water and Portugal is ablaze, yet this is not the first time these extremes have happened in Europe. The last couple of years we have had floods in one part and drought in others, and with that, wildfires.

In the distant past these may well have been signs of God's judgment. In Genesis we are reminded that God promised never to wipe the face of the earth clean again after that flood, so I for one, don't see these events in that light, but it does cause me to pause and wonder what is going on, and more importantly where do we go from here. We could take a very negative view of everything, like private Fraser in Dad's Army – 'We're doomed, doomed, I tell ye' or like corporal Jones 'Don't panic! Don't panic!' whilst really panicking. I don't believe God will give up on this earth, even as we make a mess of it, but we have to start to change the way we see it and how we live on it. Each of us, sinner or saint, are going to experience the same impact of climate changes.

I see that God's ultimate plan for this earth is to be joined and renewed with heaven as is described in Revelation 21, so we all have a vested interest in what's going on and I think we have to increase our activity in this area. As a nation we need to get better at recycling so reduce our use of limited resources; we have to move to renewable forms of power, again to reduce our dependency on fossil fuels; we have to encourage political leaders that this is the right thing to do, not just for votes now, but for the generations to come. Overall of this we need to pray for a wake-up call in leaders in all countries, or we will see in our lifetimes the low-lying islands of the pacific become a moder day Atlantis, slipping beneath the waves and that will be on all of us.

Until we as a global community really get to grips with this we will simply have to invest in good waterproofs and suntan lotion – at the same time! And probably use them on the same days. But I for one am not going to give up prayer for the change our earth needs or for trying to make better choices each day and picture in my mind the inheritance I want to leave for my grandchildren, of which there are many.

Thank you for supporting Start Up Stirling

I am writing to thank you for your kind donation of food over the harvest period which totalled an incredible 259kg. This will help us to continue to provide our services throughout the Stirling Council area for people living in hardship. Your donation will make a big difference, making sure that people and families that we help will have enough to eat.

Last year we received the highest number of referrals ever for Crisis Food, helping 3,971 individuals, 1,293 of whom were children. Because of supporters like you, we were able to distribute the equivalent of 146,868 meals to them.

So far this year we are set to match or exceed that number as more people than ever are faced with the impact of the rising cost of living and other pressures in life. That is why we continue to evolve as an organisation, to help to alleviate isolation and loneliness by running our Community Hubs as well as crisis food to provide friendship, a listening ear, refreshments, advice and activities for anyone in the local communities that the hubs serve. 30 years on, we are still providing Home Starter packs, to give someone who has received keys to a new tenancy essential household items that they need, to build their self-esteem and to make their new house a home. We helped to make this a reality for over 600 people in 2023.



As we prepare for the festive season the Kirk Sessions of Killearn and Strathblane have been considering how we manage the various services. Obviously, Stuart cannot be in both churches at the same time which means that on occasions we will have visiting preachers or some of our members will lead the services. We meet for our Sunday morning worship at 10am and Strathblane meet at 11.30. While we bed-in' the changes, we will continue with this schedule for another year, but we will be asking both congregations how they feel about this programme or whether we should be alternating timings each year. Something to think about for the future.

Thank you for the donations we received at our Harvest Festival. We received a letter of thanks from StartUp Stirling expressing gratitude for all the goods received. Strathblane Church, Strathendrick Baptist Church and Killearn Primary School also collected food stuff. Indeed, StartUp Stirling sent out a van to collect the goods and it was full when trundling its way back to Stirling. The generosity of members and friends who have donated to the Blythswood Christmas Shoebox Appeal, to be distributed to Albania, Bulgaria, Hungary, Kosovo, Moldova, Romania, Serbia and Ukraine, has been overwhelming. Doreen who coordinates this tells me that we have had donations of 59 boxes. The largest number we have ever collected. It is so easy to choose small gifts for people who have so little. We take so much for granted but a bag of sweets, a pen and notepad, hat and scarf, can mean so much to others who have nothing.

We have several services over the month of December, and all are welcome. The Sanctuary Service will be held on Sunday, 1st December in the afternoon for those who have lost a loved one or feeling lonely at this time of year. It provides a time for reflection and contemplation. The Christmas gift service will be held on the 8th and gifts will be donated to the Salvation Army Christmas Appeal to be delivered to those in need in the Stirling Council area. The family service on Christmas Eve was well supported last year and we will hold it again this year, just before we illuminate the final advent window in the village. The watchnight service in 2023 was not so well supported but we will continue this year but in a different format to see how many people attend. There can be so many pressures on families at this time of year as they travel to meet family members living elsewhere, trying to get organised after a busy work schedule and just finding time to pull everything together.

The Kirk Session meets around eight times a year and we are looking forward to a joint meeting with Strathblane in December. The agenda will be less business and more about sharing ideas as we work together as linked churches.

We are pleased to welcome Julian Pombo. Julian is on placement for six months while in his third year studying ministry at Glasgow University.

The Guild's Aim: "The Church of Scotland Guild is a movement within the Church of Scotland which invites and encourages women and men to commit their lives to Jesus Christ and enables them to express their faith in worship, prayer and action."

Since 1997 the Guild has followed a pattern of adopting a three year strategy to guide its worship, study and project work, focusing on a different aspect of that strategy each year. The strategy for 2024-27 is "Let us build a house". This strategy has been chosen to encourage the Guild as it faces many challenges and opportunities in its service and its operations. The first theme within this strategy is "Sure Foundations". During this year, Guild members will be considering the different ways in which they can interpret the theme and apply it to their lives and to the life of the Guild.

This is the serious side of the Guild but we know how to combine our good work with fun too. The programme for the year reflects this. Our meetings are held every second and fourth Tuesdays of the month in the Church Hall from 1.30 to 3.30. If you would like to come but transport is a problem we will pick you up. Visitors are welcome at all our meetings, except the Christmas Lunch (that is organised in advance).

Killearn Malawi Group News

The KMG (SC043555) had a very successful Annual Gathering with Friends in the Kirk Hall on Thursday 19th September, the first in person meeting for 5 years, with quest speakers.

After refreshments, the Chair, Ken Allen, gave a report on the activities of the group over the year 23-24, explaining the difficulties of fluctuating prices following devaluation of the Malawi Kwacha; always fluctuating up, of course. We continue to help people in Malawi, sending money to buy maize for needy families in a village in the south following floods in 2023, and sending baby clothes and craft items to a women's craft group in the north.

Sue Beck, the Treasurer presented the accounts, showing that, over the year, we had added to the reserves, which we will be using to build the girls' hostel at Nkhande Secondary School. We financed the visit of the local school management committee in Malawi to another school which had built one, and they talked to the local committee about how it was run. The famous Jumble Sale in February brought in a very healthy amount, as did the sponsored walk in May.

Our main speaker was Kevin Simpson of Malawi Fruits, a charity which works with small scale farmers in Malawi, providing solar pumps for small irrigation schemes, and polytunnels, both of which allow year round farming and harvesting, and a more regular income to the farmers. There was a very healthy discussion with Kevin at the end. We also heard from Dr Kondwani Chidziwisano by a link from Malawi about the progress with the preparation of estimates for the girl's hostel, and how scholarships for students at the school would help many to continue their education.

The meeting also re-elected the committee of eight to carry out the aims of the charity.

The next event is the Ladies' Night with Alan Parker in the Village Hall on Friday 15th November, which we hope will be a successful fundraiser, especially for the girls' hostel at Nkhande School. Shona Kelday (07882981235) has tickets.

We are applying for additional funding now as we are getting low on funds but with a lot of previous sources more restricted than before this will not be easy.
