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A different perspective

"I will call them 'my people' who are not my people; and I will call her 'my loved one' who is not my loved one," and,

"In the very place where it was said to them, 'You are not my people,' there they will be called 'children of the living God."

Romans 9: 25b-26.

For the last several years the national church and all of its component congregations, have been consumed with the Presbytery Planning process. Having to face the reality of significant reductions in ministry numbers and provision and how best to spread that fairly across the country. It is still going on in many places, some facing linkage, others union and, a few, closure.

It has not been and is not an easy season for the church to endure. Here we have engaged with the process of change with the imminent linkage between ourselves and Strathblane from the 21st March, just in time for Easter!

It is easy for such things to consume our thinking, our activity and all of our energy. It can distract us from the core purpose of the church in the world, to bring people into relationship with God, to expand and increase the family. Now we have moved through the prelude to change, we must refocus our energies on what our purpose is to proclaim in word and deed the gospel of God, that Jesus has come into the world, died on the cross for us and rose from the grave that we too may know full forgiveness in God and acceptance into God's family. From there to disciple ourselves in the way of the Master, Jesus.

I know that this is a significant part of the work of a ministry, but now that my time is to be divided between Killearn and Strathblane, we need to find new ways of doing this. We have the great blessing of having so many able and talented people in our congregation. The change that we are experiencing also provides the opportunity to do things differently, to allow others to find the ministry that God is leading them into.

Over the last five years I have tried to explain and explore the ministry of the whole people of God, now the season is here where we are to put it into practise, moving from theory into application. But now we have an opportunity to do that in partnership with others for our linkage should not be about Killearn doing its things and Strathblane their own and simply sharing the Minister's time, it can and should also be about working in partnership, bringing our different talents together to benefit both and enable both to more effectively be the people of God as He calls us to be.

I am grateful for the support and encouragement that you have given me since my coming to Killearn, I hope and pray that we will be able to continue supporting and encouraging one another in our new partnership with our brothers and sisters in Strathblane. In this new chapter for both congregations may we find the blessing of God in all we do, a renewed vision from God on His call on us, and refreshed energy equipping us to share the love of God with all who will listen.

Linkage Update.

As you may have already learned the congregational votes on the proposed Linkage between Killearn and Strathblane have been held with the following results;

	Killearn - For/against	Strathblane - For/against
For the linkage	83/0	52/4
For the continuation of Stuart's ministry	83/0	51/4
For the reviewable tenure	82/1	49/4

This being the case, Presbytery will progress to Linkage from 21st March, 2024 with a service of Linkage being organised by Presbytery for Thursday, 25th April at 7pm. At time of publishing, we do not know whether it will be held in Strathblane Church or Killearn Kirk.

The immediate impact will be that the service on Sunday 24th March will begin at 10am. At the end of the service Stuart will have to leave promptly to take the service in Strathblane starting at 11.30am.

Stuart will be present in the church prior to the 10am service if anyone wishes to speak to him. Otherwise please feel free to contact him by email or leave a message on his phone. Stuart will be dividing his time between Strathblane and Killearn.

Stuart is also Interim Moderator of Buchlyvie and Gartmore.

Ministers are equipped by training and by other church leaders for their ministry. No matter who you are, if you have received God's grace through faith in Christ, then you are a minister of Jesus Christ. The effort of every single person is essential if the church is to be all that God intends it to be.

Safeguarding

The annual Safeguarding Audit has been completed thanks to our auditors Doreen Snadden and Alison McDade. Every year we have to undertake an audit of all the safeguarding aspects required by the Church of Scotland. It covers risk assessments, personnel training audits, checks that Killearn Kirk is following all the regulations set down by the Safeguarding Service. It is our chance to reflect on everything that has occurred over the past year and to put in to place any additional support or activities needed for the coming year.

A large part of safeguarding is the recruitment of volunteers and staff, making sure every stage of the recruitment process is fully undertaken. Interviews, references, job descriptions are just some of the steps that are carefully thought through when anyone undertakes a new role at the Church.

The work is ongoing throughout the year but the annual audit which begins in January and finishes at the end of February is a time for reflection to ensure that all our systems are robust and secure. All of this goes on in the background all the time and that is as it should be but its importance can never be overstated. World Day of Prayer



The World Day of Prayer is an ecumenical movement inspired by the motto, "Informed Prayer and Prayerful Action. Members follow the example of Jesus Christ, who prayed from a place of knowledge and care for the world, and who acted from a place of prayer and connection to God.

From August 20 -27, delegates travelled from around the world to attend the World Day of Prayer International Meeting in Foz do Iguacu, Brazil. These women came from Catholic, Protestant and Orthodox traditions to pray together, share their stories in community and make decisions for the future of the movement. It was these delegates who selected the theme and writer committee for 2024.

An ecumenical group of Palestinian Christian women have prayed and reflected together over the past several years to respond to the invitation to write the 2024 programme. Their chosen theme is, "I Beg You ... Bear With One Another in Love", based on Ephesians 4: 1-7. This programme calls us to bear with each other in love, despite all difficulties and oppression.

The World Day of Prayer is held in over 100 countries and is always held on the 1st Friday of March and so for our community it was held this year in Gargunnock Parish Church. Members of the Guild and other women from the Carse Churches organised the service. We followed the scripted Programme devised by the women of Palestine.

On arrival we each received an olive tree leaf as a symbol of peace and love. The service began with the greeting Salaam - Peace be with you.

We sung Hymns and recited prayers carefully chosen by our Palestinian friends, all reflecting the theme - "I Beg You... Bear With One Another in Love."

The Worship Service shared stories of three Palestinian Christian women, who witnessed to the power of bearing together in love. Their stories illuminated the experiences of Palestinian women from three different generations. All had suffered disruption and huge distress to their lives but nevertheless they showed an amazing ability to love their neighbour and a willingness to forgive. The symbol of an olive tree was used throughout the worship service. This represented the three generations through the trunk, branches and leaves of the olive tree..

The Palestinian Christian Women who wrote the worship service have invited the world to pray for peace, justice and freedom of religion and freedom of movement. Their prayers specifically call us to pray with women, refugees, persons experiencing homelessness, and all who are sick, dying and grieving. They also call us to confess to our collective role in causing the climate crisis, and to commit to repairing what we have destroyed. Finally, they call us, the global church , to be united in treating all with justice and love.

The programme was written before the latest terrible war. The Palestinian women wrote an additional prayer which was read to us asking for an end to the war and praying for the thousands who have died, been severely injured and made refugees in their own land.

I cannot do justice to the beauty of the service I joined. It was thought provoking full of love, peace and gentleness and God's presence was tangible.

Red Squirrels At Easter

My name is Ruth Holmes and I monitor the red squirrels in the Buchlyvie area. I was chosen as a Coronation Champion for my work with red squirrels. I'm now a Royal Voluntary Service Community Champion. My role involves giving talks about red squirrels and the benefits of volunteering to community groups and high schools in Stirlingshire.

Red squirrels are our native species, and they are rare. There's only 280,000 in the UK, 80% of the 280,000 are in Scotland. In 2023, the red squirrel population increased for the first time in 10 years, it increased from 140,000 to 280,000. In 2021, red squirrels were placed on the UK's Red List for Endangered Species. Red squirrels are also a protected species.

Grey squirrels are non-native to the UK, they were brought to the UK by the Victorians. Greys are native to North America. Greys carry the squirrel pox virus, greys are immune to it but squirrel pox kills the reds. Reds who catch squirrel pox get blisters and their throat closes over. It takes a red squirrel 3 weeks to die from squirrel pox. In areas where there are both reds and greys, greys will shadow the reds during autumn when the reds are busy burying food for the winter. Once the red has gone, the grey will then go and dig up the buried food to eat it. When the red goes back to get their food during winter, they will find their food gone. Reds average number of kits are 3 or 4, greys average 7 or 8.

As you read this, the first litter of kittens or kits for short will have been born. The red squirrel breeding season is from January to September. The first litter of kits are usually born in February or March. In 2023, 11 kits were born in January in the Auchentroig area. This year, the first kit out and about in the Auchentroig area was in mid-January. This kit was born at the end of November or beginning of December, outwith the breeding season. This is rare but not the first time this has happened, the first time was in Dumfries and Galloway and the Borders in December 2020.

Kits are born deaf, dumb, blind, no fur, no teeth and their claws are curled in. It takes kits 40 days or so to leave the drey. As the kits can't leave the drey to do the toilet, they do the toilet in the drey. The mother has to replace the lining of the drey which is made from moss. It takes the mother 6 trips to replace the moss. Something to look out for when walking through woodland with red squirrels in it! When kits leave the drey, they spend the first 10 days to 2 weeks close to the nursery drey. The longer the kits are out and about, they will explore further away from the nursery drey. When kits are close to moving on to find their own territory, they will spend half a day away from the nursery drey.

Kits are chased away by their mother at 3 months old to find their own territory. Kits can travel up to 6 miles to find their own territory. When the mother chases away her first litter of kits, she is usually 2-3 weeks pregnant with her second litter. The gestation period is 5-6 weeks. The father has nothing to do with the upbringing of the kits. Once the kits are born, he moves on. He usually has more than one female on the go at once.

Wonderful to hear that red squirrels are being seen in Killearn. Happy Easter!

Kirk Accounts for the year to 31st December 2023

The accounts have now been independently examined and were approved by the Kirk Session on 12.3.24.

General Fund which covers the day to day running of the church had an income of £67,145 (2022-£70,436) and expenditure of £85,914 (2022 £87,126) resulting in a deficit of £18,769 (£16,690) The expenditure included £50,066 (2022 £52,887) payable to the CofS centrally in Edinburgh's Ministry and Mission Fund which covers the cost of our ministry and contributes to the cost of the wider work of the church at home and abroad. The General Fund stands at £54,470 (2022-£47,461). We also have £63,265 (2022 £74,229) in other unrestricted funds at 31.12.22 (excluding the Fabric Fund –see below).

2023 was also the year in which we upgraded the manse kitchen from our Fabric Fund which had an income of £4,938 (2022 £10,780) including £2,000 from The Caram Trust. Expenditure was £30,752 (2022 £42,452) resulting in a deficit of £25,814 (2022 £31,672). The Fabric Fund stands at £26,162(2022 £40,207) at 31.12.23.

We have restricted funds of £150,046) (2022 £143,160 at 31.12.22) – mainly the Helen Jamieson Bequest Fund at £145,456 (2022 £138,586).

We also have funds held centrally of £94,588 (2022 £101,444) £93,021 (2022 £97,984) of which can be used for capital purposes) and a further £71,592 (2022 £66,312) invested in The Church of Scotland Investors' Trust available for either capital or revenue purposes.

We are most grateful for the donations from members and also for the work done by the many volunteers from our members and we hope that 2024 will return our day —to day running of the church closer to break-even.
