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From the Minister's Study Desk

Matthew 25:23
Well done, good and faithful servant; ... enter thou into the joy of thy lord. KJV

On the 8th September, news broke of the death of Queen Elizabeth II. I happened to be at the service of Ordination for Ruth in Dumblane Cathedral. There was a quick reordering of things to ark that moment before we proceeded with the service. IN the coming days many things were arranged at short notice to allow space and time for people to gather and take a moment of reflection and thanksgiving for the late Queen's life of dedicated service to the nations of Great Britain, her United Kingdom. In the days that followed so much was written about her majesty's reign and life spanning her 96 years, and I cannot add anything that has not already been said. On constant theme of these reflection and reminiscences of her life was how much her faith meant to her. It inspired and strengthened her through the hard seasons of her life and the nation's life. It was a constant through the times of celebration and mourning, perhaps none more so than the passing of her husband Prince Philip, whom she described as her most beloved.

Many will have memories of having met the Queen over the long years of her reign, and these are precious to them, not simply because it was the queen but because they encountered someone who was warm and interested in them. Yes, it was the queen, and all that that meant but much more. Perhaps that is, in part, why her passing seemed to throw a blanket of sorrow across the whole nation. But a life lived in faith in Jesus Christ sows the hope that as our eyes open in the life to come we hear voice of the eternal God say to us, 'Well done, good and faithful servant; enter into my joy.'

In the time that has passed since her majesty's passing, once all the formal protocols have taken place and we have had time to take stock, I hope we can be truly grateful that our nation was guided by a woman of genuine faith, who opened buildings and parks, bridges and schools, but also one to went to places of national loss and listened.

As her majesty's faith was so central, indeed critical, for her I hope we are reminded and encouraged to follow her example to seek God's resourcing for our everyday living; his inspiration for our works of simple service; the resilience to face all that life may bring to our door with steadfastness and grace.

But a picnic is such a welcome pitstop on an adventure. They are like a water stop or refuelling stop in a race and are so welcomed by the competitors. When I ran the Glencoe marathon a couple of years ago, the last feeding station was also the marker for the last 10k and to celebrate the 'last leg' they offered us cheese-boards! A fun offering that myself and other runners were eagerly looking forward to — either for the food or it being the marker of the end stage of a hard marathon.

Did you know Jesus loved picnics? Honestly! He was regularly having breakfast on the beach or meals on the hillsides. Stopping to enjoy food with friends or refuel on an adventure has got great Biblical precedent! Where is your favourite picnic spot?

The thing about picnics is they are usually part of a journey and help you keep going to a destination. A marathon feed stop helps you get to that finish line, a sandwich at the top of a mountain helps you get back down again! And in that sense, my time with you in Killearn has helped me reach the end of my ministry training. It is a picnic that had sandwiches of learning and fizzy juice of joy, fun and laughter, all wrapped up in a basket of love. A time for which I will always be thankful.

During my probation, I have several weekend conferences and ordinarily, they are all held 'in real life'. Covid shifted us online for the first two but recently I was finally able to meet up with the other probationers and at last, we were able to eat together! Not quite a picnic but, we were able to have that refuel stop together and it also marked the start of the last six months of my probation time. After probation, my family and I will move on to an entirely new adventure and we are preparing for wherever Jesus sends us.

I am really looking forward to all the joy of Easter, the celebrations of school exams finishing, the Killearn 10k and supporting the Scottish Cross Country Cycling race series as the Sports Chaplain! Hopefully, it allows the Churches to have a message of both 'come to Church' and 'Go to all people'.

Words that I have often sung and said, and I am very thankful I have the opportunity to put those words into action in my very first ministry. Presbytery Update.

The final meeting of Stirling Presbytery will take place in December when it is hoped to avoid business and spend time celebrating the work that it has done over such a long span of years. As we mark the change of the year – as the bells sound – so Stirling Presbytery will cease to exist and a new, enlarged presbytery of Perth will assume the responsibilities for the oversight of this area. There will undoubtedly be a tie of transition and bedding in of our systems of governance and support and we are all encouraged to pray for the new Presbytery its officers and those representing each congregation.

Presbytery Mission Plan: Killearn and Strathblane.

On the 1st of September Presbytery approved its Mission Plan. At the time of writing, we still await formal ratification of the plan by the national committee remitted to examine and approve all plans, but as advanced conversations were held with them through the development of the plan, it is hoped that this will be more of a formality than a hurdle. The approved plan states;

In considering the structural alteration of the current parishes, two congregations expressed a preference for the establishment of two charges each comprising three congregations. Four of the congregations preferred a different arrangement putting four congregations into one charge and two into the other. As this was the majority view the Presbytery is willing to support this.

The congregations of Balfron and Fintry and Buchanan and Drymen are to link as a single charge, and this is seen as the first stage in the process. The linked congregations of Buchanan and Drymen should unite and the linked congregations of Balfron and Fintry should also unite.

The congregations of Killearn and Strathblane to join in linkage.

The newly linked congregations should actively consider union following adjustment.

The future of Killearn is initially in partnership, or linkage, with Strathblane. A small group of Elders form both congregations will be meeting in the time to come to discuss what and how this may work in practise and to consider all the practical issues that will need to be addressed. As has been stated before, the minister in Strathblane is in unrestricted tenure and as such implementation of change may not take place immediately. This does not stop the work of planning form taking place, nor looking at ways of doing more together in partnership.

We have to recognise that this may not be the final structural change that will happen in the future, as the plan clearly states that the linked charges should consider union following initial adjustment. The reason for this is reduce the administrative weight carried by the minister who, in a linkage, has to 'manage' two separate churches and chair their meeting, Stated Annual Meetings of the congregation etc. A important precursor to that though is the building up of trust and

relationship to form a solid bedrock on which to build for the future.

We encourage all of the church family and the wider community to keep the current local situation in their prayers looking for a creative and workable plan to be shaped and for the futures ministries of Stuart and Ruth and their families.

On-line Worship.

If you every miss a service, remember that we record our service, and you can watch them at any time. You can access these via the website. We will be doing some phased upgrading of the audio-visual system of the church with the view that we may be able to stream the services in real time, but we want to ensure that this would be of a high image and sound quality and as such may be the last phase of the improvements we are ging to be doing.

Help needed.

We are looking for people willing to be shown how to operate the updated AV system of the church to help make sure things run smoothly on Sundays. If you are interested, please let us know and we'll get you on board.

We are always open to people coming forward to take part in the worship life of the church, whether that is welcoming people at the door, making refreshments for afterwards, sharing the reading or leading us in prayer.

No experience is needed, and support and guidance will be given as you need.

Don't bury your gifts, let them out to play and we will all be enriched by them.

New Website.

As you read this, we hope that our new look website will be in operation. It has a fresher look and though much of the same information is there as there was before, it has been 'built' to make it easer to operate and keep up to date as well as connecting with the Kirk's social media accounts. Check it out!

New things to look out for.

The Kirk regularly reviews what it is doing, and if it is meeting the needs of its members and the wider community. There are a couple of new ventures we are developing that we hope will start over the coming months.

We all will understand how hard it can be to face the passing of a loved one and with this in mind it is planned to hold a short reflective service at the start of December to give space for people to take time before the rush of Christmas overtakes us.

This is on the back of the appreciation shown for the service last year. In addition, we are looking to start, want can be most easily described as, a bereavement group. A time and space for those coming to terms with

loss to meet and have some company and pee support in this new phase of their loves – more details on this will follow as we firm up plans.

With changes in the Kirk Session and future changes envisaged in the organisation of the church, we are looking to overhaul the Pastoral Care systems we have. We want to develop a wider team of what we are calling 'Befrienders' to enhance the care network of the Kirk.

We are currently firming up these plans and we hope to soon offer an opportunity for those interested in what it is all about to come along and hear about it. From that group we hope that a few volunteers will feel that they can support this important work of the Kirk, not only in our congregational family but also the wider community. More details will be coming soon.

Wednesday Prayers.

Each Wednesday the Session House is open from 10am to 11am for those wishing to spend time in prayer. It is open to anyone to come along whose heart is moved to bring the needs of people and the world to God in prayer.

If you or someone you know would like prayers said for an individual or family, those gathering for prayer are happy to do that.

There are small prayer slips in the entrance of the church and a box in which to place them. We don't need to know every detail, just enough to pray for them, a name and the reason is enough. We appreciate if we can be kept informed about the matter and if prayers need to change their focus.

Sunday Pre-service Prayers.

There is an opportunity to meet and pray for the service each week between 10:45 and 10:55 in the entrance between the hall and the church, all are welcome to join in.

Kirk Session News

As we move into the Autumn season it is hard to believe that summer has now left us behind. During the summer we heard of the sad loss of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II. A long life well lived but it still came as a shock for many when she passed away. The Church opened for prayers and a book of remembrance was available for the community to sign that will be forwarded to Buckingham Palace. Stuart led a special service on the Saturday for reflection and remembrance of Her Royal Highness, Queen Elizabeth II. After observing above, about the death of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, I would intimate that a tree to commemorate her Platinum Jubilee will be planted it in an area near the Kirk Halls. We are awaiting the delivery of a Taxus Fastigiata (Irish Yew). The tree is being funded by the Jubilee Committee who have also provided a plaque noting the occasion.

Over the past few months, we have been continuously reviewing the changes of the restrictions for Covid 19. Restrictions have been lifted, although the seating at the back of the church is less crowded, if folk wish space. We are now able to enjoy meeting together to have a cup of tea or coffee after the service which is a lovely time for fellowship. The Guild restarted on 11th Oct and look forward to welcoming friends on the second and fourth Tuesday afternoons of the month. Wednesday morning prayer meetings restarted and other organisations using the hall were able to return. Many people are enjoying being able to get out and about and meet up with friends. These past couple of years has been unprecedented and I for one am glad that some normality has returned.

Our Session meetings resumed on 13th September giving the Kirk Session time to catch up and discuss various aspects of church life. One area that we are working on is the upgrading of our audio- visual system. Fibre broadband is now available in the church, so we are looking to be able to live- stream the services. Recordings of the service will continue to be available on the website. The church website was beginning to look tired, so a small focus group was assembled to look at this. Hopefully by the end of October the new site will be up and running.

Over the summer the Presbytery Draft Mission Plan had been a very significant focus for us. The Draft Plan has been approved by the Presbytery and has now been submitted to the Faith Nurture Forum and General Trustees of the Church of Scotland for their consideration. The Draft Mission Plan indicates that Killearn Kirk and Strathblane Parish Church will work together as a linkage. This means that one minister will cover the two churches. We will also have the availability of an Ordained Local Minister who will be shared between Killearn/Strathblane and with Buchanan/Drymen/Balfron/Fintry. We look forward to working with Strathblane Church and exploring news ways of working together. It is understood that these arrangements will be confirmed by the Church of Scotland at the beginning of the new year.

Ruth Kennedy, our probationer minister was ordained at Dunblane Cathedral on Thursday, 8th September. It was a lovely service with Ruth choosing the hymns and made extra special that her mother was able to participate in the service as she is a retired Deacon. We wish Ruth well in her new post in Dunblane as a pioneer minister, working with the under 40's. Bethany Pringle, one of our members, has been taking some of the church services as a Candidate for Ministry, while continuing her Ministry Degree at University. She will be going to Stirling North Church in January for a short period of training. We encourage Bethany in her ongoing studies and pray for her as she manages family life and the requirements of study.

As we move into autumn and Christmas fast approaching, we look forward to welcoming everyone to the various activities and to our regular church services.

Finance Update

At most Session Meetings I present a snapshot of the General Account which covers the day-to-day running of the Kirk and at the most recent Session I presented a snapshot of the 8 months to $31^{\rm st}$ August 2022. Our income at £48,947 compared to the previous equivalent period of £50,112. However our expenditure increased from £53,658 to £59789 and included our contribution to the Ministry and Mission Fund of £36,069 - an increase of £2,331. Other cost increases included Heating & Lighting £1,364 and Building Costs £1,511. The net result was a deficit of £10,842 against a deficit of £3,546

We are also in the middle of a substantial upgrade of our AV facilities which we are able to fund from our Fabric Fund and our year-end accounts will reflect these non-recurring costs – outwith the day-to-day running costs. Looking ahead we will incur increased Heating costs next year although our Giving to Grow contribution (which replaces the current M&M contribution) will be slightly less. All in all these are tough times but are very grateful for the contributions made by our members and visitors many of whom have signed for Gift Aid tax Recovery which allows us to recover 25% of tax-payers' donations from the government.

My thanks go to the Finance Committee members of Teresa Prescott (assistant treasurer), Scott Macintosh and Helen Gee, who handles Gift Aid claims.

Ukrainian Concert

In August Killearn Kirk had the joy of hosting a charity concert in aid of both the Hippokrat Society of Ukraine and the victims of the Russian war in Ukraine.

The two musicians who so ably entertained us, Igor Saienko and Oleksii Kolomoiets are graduates of the National Music Academy of Ukraine and professional accordionists. They have been winners of international music competitions and festivals and take part in charity events in Ukraine and abroad. Indeed Igor and Oleksii have toured churches in the UK for the past 18 years, performing accordion concerts to raise money for the Hippokrat society.

The Hippokrat Society was founded 22 years ago to help mothers and disabled children in the Chernigiv region of Ukraine, 70 km from the site of the Chernobyl nuclear disaster. Chernigiv with a population of 320,000, had at least 1000 children born with physical and learning disabilities soon after the disaster. These children have grown into young adults with complex needs, and sadly babies continue to be born with severe disabilities. Hippokrat provides food, financial support and a day centre offering a range of activities for the children, young people and mutual support for mothers. In addition the money raised by Igor and Oleksii provides some children with

This year Igor and Oleksii received special permission to leave Ukraine for three weeks to do their charity tour in aid of Hippokrat and the victims of the war in Ukraine.

The final concert of the tour held in Killearn Kirk was attended by Igor's family who are being hosted in Drymen. The poignancy of this was felt by every member of the audience. Igor extended his gratitude to all who supported his, and other Ukrainian families, to find safety, peace and love in Endrick villages.

The programme the young men played for us evoked a whole range of emotions. We smiled, we felt happy, we were moved to tears by the beauty of the music and the expertise of the musicians. The first half consisted of Ukrainian and Russian pieces by composers such as Bortnyansky, Hulak-Artemonvsky, and Victoria Poleva among others. It was exciting to hear the work of a female composer from Ukraine in Victoria's "Walking on Waters". I imagine the composers were new to many of us in the audience but as always the East European music had us both dancing in our seats or fighting back the tears.

After the interval and refreshments we were entertained with familiar pieces by Handel, Jenkins, Lennon and Webber. All very enjoyable and jolly. Then Igor spoke a few words introducing us to Elgar and explaining that they had chosen to play for us the 9th and best known of Elgar's Enigma variations, Nimrod, in memory and dedication to the hundreds who had lost their lives in recent months in the fight for their beloved country, Ukraine.

As they started to play the piece I can only document my own feelings, suffice to say the lump in my throat nearly stopped me breathing. We are accustomed to sad reflection at Remembrance Day Services where Nimrod is always played but that evening in August took these feelings to an entirely new level.

Fortunately they played a funny piece to end their recital, entitled McMozart's" Eine Kleine Bricht Moonlight Nicht Musik" giving us something to smile at and time to compose ourselves before we had to stand up and leave the Kirk.

A truly memorable evening for all of us. I do hope Igor and Oleksii stay safe and well back in Ukraine and that they will return some day to play their magical music for us in Killearn Kirk.
